



NCAA National Championship: An Overview

NCAA Division One Equestrian is a result of Title IX legislation, added to the list of women's collegiate sports in 1998. Talented young riders from across the country now have the opportunity to receive scholarship money, elite training, academic support and other benefits associated with Division One athletics. Earning an education from an outstanding university while simultaneously pursuing an athletic passion is a blessing for myself and many others.

Unlike most collegiate sports which have a designated season, equestrian is year-round. Team workouts, meetings, practices and competitions (we refer to them as "meets") begin in August and continue throughout the entire academic year. Though each individual meet is important, every team has one ultimate goal in mind: winning the National Collegiate Equestrian Association (NCEA) National Championship in April. The National Championship is the culmination of eight months of hard work and sacrifice, and every team is hungry for victory. This is the Super-Bowl of college equestrian, and the title is truly anyone's to win.

Beginning on Wednesday, April 17th and ending on Saturday, April 20th, NCEA teams will faceoff at the Extraco Events Center in Waco, Texas for the 2019 NCEA National Championship. This year, there will be six NCEA National Titles and one National Championship Team Title up for grabs. This is a new format, adopted in 2018, which allows schools with single discipline teams to compete at the National Championship. Every stage of competition will be



organized in a bracket head-to-head format. Brackets are determined by the seeding of teams based on regular season competition results.

The top eight teams will vie for the NCEA National Championship Team Title. Each team will compete with four riders in each of the four events: Equitation over Fences, Equitation on the Flat, Horsemanship and Reining. The team that receives the most points out of the 16 that are available will advance to the next day of competition. Team competition will begin on Wednesday, April 17th with the quarterfinals and semifinals. The final championship round will take place on Saturday, April 20th.

The top 16 teams will compete for the four NCEA National Championship Event Titles in separate brackets for each of the four aforementioned NCEA events. Competition for these titles will begin on Wednesday, April 17th with the first round of action. Quarterfinals and semifinals will occur on Friday, April 19th, and the finals will take place on championship Saturday, April 20th.

Lastly, the two Discipline Titles, one for Hunt Seat (Equitation over Fences and Equitation on the Flat) and one for Western (Horsemanship and Reining), will be awarded to the team that accrues the most points for each respective discipline throughout the four days of competition. The winners of these two titles are announced on Saturday, April 20th.

The NCEA National Championship is truly the most exciting part of the collegiate equestrian season, where athletes go above and beyond for their team. Please join us and experience one of the most unique events in college sports! Admission is free and the event is entirely indoors, so not even the weather can dampen our fans' enjoyment! Championship Saturday on April 20th is the peak of the week's excitement and energy, so this is a great day to come out.

The Championship also presents a great opportunity for Junior riders to learn about the format and structure of college equestrian and talk to current student-athletes. As a Senior at Baylor University, I encourage you to consider



becoming an NCAA equestrian. Doing so is undoubtedly the best decision I have made. Being part of a team in a characteristically individual sport is an experience like no other. You will have fun and improve as a rider. But perhaps more importantly, you will learn what it means to be a part of a team. You will gain an understanding of the reward in achieving shared goals. Cooperation, humility, dedication and effective leadership are just a few of the attributes you will soon possess as an NCEA student-athlete. NCEA cultivates habits and attitudes that prepare you well for life after college and are transferable to all professions with a built in network of professional contacts. With its emphasis on not only athletic and academic excellence, but also character and moral formation, NCEA is an unparalleled opportunity. Again, I welcome you to come out to the 2019 NCEA National Championships to see what it is all about!

Reduce Stress... Stretch as you ride

If you ever go to the barn stressed, then read on, because in this article you will find one simple way to reduce stress as you set the tone for a breakthrough ride.

It is so often that we as riders go to the barn stressed out, uptight, and disconnected... we come to the barn distracted, senses overloaded, our mind on too many things yet on nothing at all. The barn is our reprieve, our solace, or sanctuary... Unfortunately, we can bring that stress into our everyday rides, and that can make our horses uptight. As horse owners it is our responsibility to keep our horses happy, healthy and comfortable. If we regularly go to the barn stressed out, our horse begins to anticipate this and they may not want to be a part of it. It carries over to our rides.

When you get on your horse tight in mind and body, your horse instantly picks up on it, and this sets the tone for the rest of the ride. Horses make great mirrors, and sometimes the reflection we see isn't always the most pleasant.

We all have heard that we need to

change ourselves if we want to change our horses. Stretching can be a simple key to profound change. Stretching horseback is a great way to set the tone for an amazing ride, even if you are having "one of those days."

When you stretch horseback you will notice the huge changes you see in your horse as he relaxes and realizes you are making a mental shift. He may yawn, lower his head, lick and chew, move more freely. As we relax, so does our horse.

While experimenting with this exercise, you will notice that the shackles the world puts on you begin to melt away as you connect with the "here and now." In doing the exercise not only will you loosen and stretch any tight areas, but you will find an internal connection and relaxation that lays the foundation for a great ride.



Here is a great stretch to help you unwind and connect with your horse.

Summary of Steps:

1. Beginning at a halt, reach your right hand across the withers and scratch your horse on the left shoulder, reaching further down to increase the stretch.

 Reach your right hand back and scratch your horse on the hindquarters.


3. Switch hands and repeat on the other side.

4. When you are comfortable you can proceed to do this stretch in forward motion.
